Between 63 and 159 people participated in coastal clearing every day in Pothuvil, Thirrukovil, and Kalmunai. This seem to be a big problem for some, especially poor women where parents/property has been lost, to be able to get married due to the high amount paid as dowry. Equipping the young women with education and jobs well give them some support, why possibilities for vocational training will be investigated further.</li> <li>• 18 sewing machines and 6 grinding machines has until now, been distributed to Muslim widows in Sainthamaruthu.</li> <li>• Participated in organizing a one-day training for all PSP volunteers from all NGO’s working in Pottuvil.</li> <li>• Meeting with Zonal Educational Director Akkariapattu, discussed distribution of shoes, bags, etc., to affected children and upgrading schools in the affected area</li> <li>• Meeting with new Head of Mission, Ampara ICRC and Eco/sec delegate ICRC about involvement into livelihood. GOAL Sri Lanka	<p><b>Rubble Removal</b>  This portion of the programme is clearing up public spaces, schools, houses and roads to allow access into areas that have been destroyed. It is done in collaboration with local government and local communities. They aim to use Cash For Work strategies so that people directly benefit from this CFW employment.  It will not be possible to clear rubble on the sites of people’s houses until the government assessor takes a look at the damage and pay compensation to families; this will delay house clearance at least until March 2005.</p> <p><b>Waste Management</b>  This involves clearing household waste– GOAL is supporting the local government to manage the waste disposal – providing transport and logistics. At present GOAL is trying to make sure there is more recycling of construction materials. GOAL will help to make sure the dumps are improved and enlarged to cater for the increase in rubbish. GOAL is also assessing the possibility of working with a local partner on this aspect of the programme.</p> <p><b>Sanitation</b>  GOAL is constructing latrines adjacent to temporary shelters and supporting the local authorities with septic tank clearance through the provision of equipment and local staff.</p> <p><b>Water Infrastructure</b>  GOAL is cleaning canals and draining lagoons filled with sea water and debris. 	<p>water to displaced families in field locations.</p> <p><b>Non Food Items</b> GOAL is distributing non food - bedding, clothing, shoes, hygiene kits, mosquito nets. This programme will end in April.</p> <p><b>Roads Programme</b> Goal is working in collaboration with local communities and authorities to clean roads and do repairs to infrastructure (bridges, culverts, etc.) working in partnership with the Road Development Authority.</p> <p><b>Permanent Housing (Rehab)</b> GOAL is assessing the damage to permanent houses and will assist in the rehabilitation of partially destroyed houses. This will facilitate families to return to their homes as quickly as possible. GOAL will be providing on average €400 per house to repair one or two habitable rooms through the provision of building materials and components. This will also encourage and revitalise local business such as carpentry and masonry. GOAL is planning to assist with the construction of permanent housing, it is expected that this will be slower to start due to the process of obtaining the planning permission and approvals.</p> <p><b>Transitional Shelter</b> The construction of temporary housing enables families to live independently until they begin work on a permanent solution. GOAL is constructing temporary housing for vulnerable families who have lost their homes.</p> <p><b>Cash for work</b> The communities are identifying the projects to be carried out and GOAL is supporting this work with funding and logistical support.</p> <p><b>Quick Impact Projects (QIP'S)</b> GOAL is supporting a variety of quick impact projects such as pre-school's, block and rope production facilities, bicycle distributions to community groups etc. These QIP's are intended to support local initiatives which are getting people's livelihoods back up and running.</p> <p><b>Boating repair and the boating industry</b> GOAL is working with local cooperatives and communities in rehabilitating partially damaged boats, providing nets and replacing outboard motors. GOAL is working to restore what had previously existed and works in cooperation with the Ministry of Fisheries and FAO. GOAL is currently in the process of purchasing nets to equip 50 boats of various sizes.</p>
